

Ready, Set, VOTE Kansas!

The November 3, 2020 election is only weeks away. Now is the time for voters to get ready for election day. Because of the ongoing COVID-19 health crisis, it is critical that voters consider the safest ways to vote in the election. Oral Health Kansas wants to help people know the ways to prepare to cast their ballot.

READY

Register—In Kansas, voter registration is open until October 13. If you are not registered, go to <https://www.kdor.ks.gov/Apps/VoterReg/Default.aspx> to sign up to vote. Not sure if you're registered already? Check your voter registration status [here](#).

SET

Ballot—The 2020 general election in Kansas includes races for the President, a U.S. Senate seat, all 4 U.S. House of Representatives seats, all 40 Kansas Senate seats, and all 125 Kansas House of Representatives seats. The ballot may also include local elections. Check with your local election commission to see if you can get a sample ballot.

VOTE

Voting options—There are several ways you can cast your ballot.

Absentee Voting—In Kansas, you can request an absentee, or mail-in, ballot. The deadline for requesting a ballot is October 27. We strongly recommend requesting and submitting your mail-in ballot as soon as possible to ensure your vote is counted!

All ballots MUST be postmarked on or before election day and received in the county election office by the close of business on the Friday following the election. When filling out the ballot, make sure you sign your name the same as what it is listed on your voter registration. Frequently Asked Questions about Advance Voting in Kansas can be found [here](#).

Early Voting—Voters can cast ballots at Early Voting sites from October 14 through 12:00p.m. on November 2nd. Contact the local election commission to find out the places you can vote early. Be sure to take photo identification. Allowed identification includes Driver's License, U.S. Passport, U.S. Military ID, ID card issued by a Native American tribe, Employee badge issued by a government office, Student ID card from an accredited postsecondary education institution in Kansas, Concealed carry license issued by Kansas or another state, and Public assistance ID card issued by a government office. Election Day— Double check your polling place for November 3rd. This information is usually on your voter identification card, or you can check here: <https://myvoteinfo.voteks.org/voterview>. Make sure to bring your voter identification. Voting hours are 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM on November 3rd.
