National Oral Health Data Portal

A new National Oral Health Data Portal was launched this month after two years of development. In 2020 the Association of State and Territorial Dental Directors (ASTDD) secured funding from Delta Dental of Michigan and Glaxo Smith Kline to create the nation's first comprehensive oral

health data portal. John O'Malley of Positive Sum Population Health Informatics has been the lead for the project which launched in January of 2022.

The ASTDD National Oral Health Data Portal brings oral health status, workforce, access, cost, and quality of life information from existing federal, state, and other datasets into one consolidated publicly accessible website. The website has multiple exploratory features such as curated dashboards, custom visualization builders, and downloadable reports to support a wide audience with actionable national, state, and local data. More than 30 separate oral health datasets with state and national scope have been centralized into one website to remove the barriers that epidemiologists, statisticians, care providers, policymakers, public health officials, legislators, researchers, and the public face in getting actionable information to improve our oral health care system.

Elements of the National Oral Health Data Portal include:

- **1.** Dataset Explorer helping users find and interpret the oral health information they need from different public oral health datasets, filterable by topic, geography, and population.
- **2.** National Oral Health Surveillance System Dashboard consolidating 32 of the child and adult indicators to examine state performance across many measures in one view.
- **3.** Public Github Repository hosting raw data files, detailed descriptions of the datasets and the processes to incorporate them into the National Oral Health Data Portal, and code used to generate analyses.

The project collaborated with state/territorial dental directors and program staff to help make the new oral health database as complete and useful to our stakeholders as possible. Join us in learning how to access and use the new National Oral Health Data Portal!

Drop in Children's Preventive Care During Pandemic

Public Health Reports published a new study by Maternal and Child Health Bureau (MCHB) researchers called <u>Missed and Delayed Preventive Health Care Visits Among US Children Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic</u>. Using data from the Census Bureau's

Household Pulse Survey collected in April/May 2021, the researchers estimated missed, skipped, or delayed preventive checkups among households with children in the previous 12 months. They found that about 26% of these households had at least one or more children under age 18 who had missed or delayed their preventive visit because of the pandemic. **Find out** the most common reasons for missed/delayed preventive health care visits, variations between states, socioeconomic differences, and more.



Here's Why Health Equity Needs Teeth

People living in poverty or who are members of communities of color face oral disease at higher rates than other communities. Continued separation of dental care from medical care exacerbates these inequities, creating difficult choices involving pain, payment

options, and inadequate care in emergency departments.

CareQuest Institute reports that a new peer-reviewed article in the AMA Journal of Ethics highlights how value-based approaches to health care can improve outcomes for everyone. "Clinicians, payers, communities, policymakers, employers, and other decision-makers must collectively decide to promote justice," write the authors. "An integrated system of medicine and oral health care must bring attention to disparities and build policy, practice, and research solutions to support equity."

The authors share four components of a healthcare system that can reduce inequities for marginalized communities:

- integrates medical and dental services
- focuses on prevention rather than disease management
- reimburses providers based on quality of care and patient outcomes
- invests in training a more diverse health care workforce
