Veterans Need for Oral Health Care

In honor of the Memorial Holiday weekend ahead, we wanted to highlight how important access to oral health for veterans is to us all.

Veterans' access to dental care varies depending on their eligibility for benefits. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) provides dental benefits to some veterans, but the

availability and extent of these benefits depends on several factors, such as service-connected disabilities, former prisoner of war status, and eligibility for VA healthcare.

The VA offers comprehensive dental care services to certain veterans, including diagnostic, preventive, and restorative treatments. However, these services are not automatically available to all veterans, and eligibility requirements apply. Veterans can check with their local VA healthcare facility or visit the VA website for information on dental benefits and how to apply.

In 2021, the American Institute of Dental Public Health (AIDPH) and CareQuest Institute for Oral Health collaborated with veteran service organizations and military partners to disseminate a 39-question survey, the 2021 Veteran Oral Health Survey, assessing self-reported oral health and other physical health outcomes among veterans nationally.

- 35.5% of rural veterans rate their dental health as "poor" compared with 28.5% of urban veterans
- More than 1/3 of rural veterans selected "other" as their dental insurance type, with the most common response being "none" or "self-pay"
- Roughly 72% of rural veterans reported routinely accessing dental care in a private practice clinic, compared with 64% of urban veterans

Increased eligibility for dental care would allow veterans to receive dental care where they are already receiving medical care. Strengthening the Community Care Program implemented through the MISSION Act can multiply care delivery location options for rural veterans who

currently lack access to a VA facility. Providers should register for this program, and reimbursement rates should remain competitive to expand and sustain this network.

Get Involved

IAIDPH will kickoff their new Veteran Oral Health Action Collaborative in a launch call on June 8. The Collaborative is an eight-month intensive program that will feature innovative presentations and hand-on applied learning in partnership with CareQuest Institute for Oral Health. Monthly sessions will feature inter-professional presenters and will build on concepts of care integration and value-based designs while advancing solutions to veteran oral health issues. The Impact of Mental Health on Your Oral Health

Mental health issues such as stress, anxiety, depression, or other conditions can have a direct impact on oral health. People experiencing mental health challenges may be more prone to neglecting their oral hygiene practices, which can lead to dental problems like gum disease, tooth decay, or bad breath. Some medications used to manage mental health conditions may have side effects that affect oral health. For example, medications like

antidepressants or antipsychotics may cause dry mouth (xerostomia), which reduces saliva production and increases the risk of tooth decay and gum disease. Many individuals with mental health issues, particularly anxiety disorders, may experience dental anxiety or dental phobia. The fear of dental procedures can prevent people from seeking necessary dental care, leading to untreated oral health problems.

Oral health can significantly impact an individual's self-esteem and confidence. Did you know that 48% of young adults have untagged themselves from a photo on Facebook because of their smile? According to research from the ADA Health Policy Institute, one in four Kansas adults feel embarrassment about their teeth. Dental issues like missing teeth, discolored teeth, or bad breath can contribute to feelings of embarrassment or self-consciousness, potentially exacerbating mental health challenges. It also leads to lack of self-confidence when applying for employment. We are hopeful with the additional dental services for adults KanCare (Medicaid) now provides members, many Kansans will have the chance to feel more positive in their job search and speaking to others.

My Dental Care Passport is a new tool available through a collaboration led by Oral Health Kawas a collaborated project among Aetna Better Health of Kansas, United Healthcare, Sunflower Health Plan and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, as well as

disability and dental providers and advocates. My Dental Care Passport is designed to improve the dental office visit for people with disabilities by letting individuals and their families/caregivers voice their specific needs. The passport is not only designed for people with disabilities but can also be usedby people with a mental illness who struggle with dental visits and are not sure how to explain their circumstances. Sharing important information, for example, how a person likes to communicate, what they liked in past dentist visits, and what parts of the appointment might be hard for them, helps break down communication barriers and allows the dental team to make changes to the dental office and appointment plan before the person even arrives. This helps make the visit to the dentist better for everyone.

The Passport is unique to an individual. It may contain personal information and descriptions of personal experiences. This information can be incredibly useful for the dentist and their team to make the dental visit as successful as possible. However, this information is not to be shared with anyone outside of the dental office, including other healthcare professionals, without the user's permission.
