Dental Public Health Leadership Opportunities

Don't miss the opportunity to apply for two American Institute of Dental Public Health Academy experiences: Federal Service Immersion (FSI) program and the Dental Public Health Leadership Academy. Deadlines are approaching soon, apply now!

- The AIDPH Federal Service Immersion (FSI) Program will be held on September 16 19, 2024 in Washington DC, The AIDPH FSI is a week-long, immersive learning experience exploring the intersection of dental public health infrastructure, federal funding, policy, programming, and advocacy. FSI hosts in-person site visits to federal health agencies where participants can engage with leaders to learn about the role and operations of each agency. Register for the Fall 2024 Local Public Health Leadership Series

The purpose of the Local Public Health Leadership Series is to enhance the ability of the local and state public health workforce to exercise leadership in the delivery of Medicaid services. The LPHLS will develop core knowledge and skills related to identifying and responding to adaptive challenges. The focus will be on leadership

competencies identified by the Kansas Leadership Center: Diagnosing the Situation, Managing Self, Energizing Others and Intervening Skillfully. This is a four-session training offered by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment in collaboration with the Kansas Association of Local Health Departments.

Who Should Participate?

Any Kansas public health professionals in the state or local health departments, community health centers, or other public health professionals who provide services to Medicaid beneficiaries and want to lead more effectively. Leadership involves mobilizing others, sometimes without direct authority to do so, in an effort to address complex community challenges. These difficult, adaptive challenges don't have a single expert or manager that can fix them. Progress can be made to address these challenges, but requires learning, involvement of stakeholders and persistent efforts. Public health professionals are in key positions to provide this kind of leadership. (Priority will be given to state and local health department applicants.)

The Wichita State University Community Engagement Institute will serve as faculty and coaches for the series, which is modeled after the Kansas Leadership Center's training curriculum and methods.

It's Not Too Early to Prepare to Vote

Are you registered to vote? If you're not sure, you can visit this <u>website</u>, enter your name and date of birth. It will say whether you are registered or not. You can register to vote <u>online</u> or on paper in <u>English</u> or <u>Spanish</u>.

Kansas allows voters to advance vote in person at county election offices or satellite voting locations up to 20 days before an election. For the 2024 election,

counties may begin in-person advancing voting on July 17 for the primary election and October 16 for the general election. The deadline for in-person advance voting is 12:00 p.m. August 5, 2024 for the primary election and 12:00 p.m. November 4, 2024 for the general election. Voters are encouraged to contact their local election office to confirm advance voting dates and locations for their respective county. The Secretary of State's office will also provide this information in July and October prior to each election.

Individuals who vote in person at the county election office or at a satellite location must show photographic identification. If an advance voter does not provide identification, or if the information is not valid, the county election officer may issue a provisional ballot to the voter. The provisional ballot will not be considered valid until the voter submits their photographic identification to before the county canvass.

By Mail

Voters are allowed to vote by mail prior to election day in the state of Kansas. In order to do so, you must complete an application for an advance ballot and include your driver's license number or a copy of your photo identification. The deadline to submit advance voting applications to your county election official is July 30 for the 2024 primary election and October 29 for the 2024 general election. Ballots will be mailed to those who apply beginning July 17 for the 2024 primary election and October 16 for the 2024 general election. All ballots MUST be postmarked on or before election day and received in the county election office by the close of business on the third business day following the election.
